 <p>Thunderstorms</p>	<p>Thunderstorm</p>  <p><u>What to do in Severe Weather:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continue listening to the news • Go to a secure location • Stay away from windows and large open rooms • Stay inside 	 <p>Lightning</p>
<p>Safety</p>	<p><u>What to do if there is a wildfire:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stay calm • Move away from vegetation • Lie face down and cover your body • Call 911 	<p>Lightning</p>  <p><u>What to do when there is lightning:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Avoid open fields and hill tops • Stay away from tall trees • If you're in a group, spread out • Stay away from water and wet objects
<p>Wildfire</p> 	<p><u>What to do during a Tornado:</u></p>  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Go to the basement, a safe room, or an interior room with no windows • Stay calm • If outside, seek shelter immediately • Being in a vehicle is not safe – get out and seek shelter in a low lying area such as a ditch 	<p>Safety</p>
